

Shriver, distinguished Professor Emeritus of Applied Christianity at Union Theological Seminary in NYC, has in 3 countries (Germany, South Africa, and the USA) pursued this question: How may any society recall its past errors in such a way as both to resolve "never again" to those errors and to construct a more positive future?

Avoding moralism, he has provided a very practical guide to how societies can change, and indeed in specific cases have changed, for their better common good. He takes us to those historical locations (museums, unearthed sites of crimes committed, monuments), textbooks used in schools, and anniversary observances where memory of past misdeeds has been put at the service of constructing more humane and hopeful societies. The evidence is abundantly at hand that "honest patriotism" is achievable, has been accomplished in specific instances, and needs to be performed in our American society at the beginning of the third millenium C.E.

I do not know of a more "relevant" book for energizing honest patriotism as counterthrust to the seachange of American society in recent years, a change after 9/11 that has taken us into "pre-emptive" war, uses of illegal torture, the Patriot Act, and the extensive unraveling of our social safety nets.
